Extract from an email from Dave Owen at the St Helens Ranger Service

I've been passed your e-mail regarding putting up wildlife cameras around Rainford.

Unfortunately, I don't have any experience with wildlife 'trail cam' cameras but I would say that the priority is not to affect the wildlife in any detrimental way. This would include where the cameras are positioned and the interference which may be caused putting them up and checking them.

There is also a need for careful consideration about what is done with any footage. This should not leave the wildlife vulnerable to anybody seeing this footage in regards to the locality of nests and other vulnerable species eg Brown Hare, Hedgehog and Roe Deer.

I would strongly suggest looking online for specific guidance in the use of these cameras and consider where to get the correct permission to put them up. It may be best to put them up in people's gardens that agree to them as there wouldn't be a problem with permission and they'd be more secure and less liable to be stolen or damaged.

The idea is for volunteers to provide breakfast for people at the hall on Christmas day.

My thinking is that some people won't have much company that day and it would be nice if they could at least have one meal with others. I'm not thinking of anything complex, we could get some toasters in the kitchen and just churn out toast and crumpets for a couple of hours. It would be cheap enough to buy some bread, butter and jam; or we could even do BYOJ (bring your own jam). We could put Christmas music on in the hall and it will already be decorated for Christmas.

I'm absolutely not suggesting that we ask Vicky or Sally to work Christmas day, like I say I would see this would be a volunteer effort.

I'm happy to give a couple of hours of my own time and my mum has said the same. Others have offered to help too so I have no worries about recruiting sufficient volunteers. I can open up, lock up and sort the alarm.

We could get somebody in to do PAT testing and ask people to bring their toasters into the hall a week or two before Christmas to get them signed off and then bring them in on the day to increase capacity.

The costs that I can see are:

- tea/coffee/hot chocolate/milk*
- bread/crumpets etc*
- butter/jam/honey/marmalade etc*
- some cheap crackers; and*
- PAT testing*

I don't envision those costs being too significant and I'm happy to pay them out of my own pocket. I wouldn't want to charge, but perhaps we could put a collection bucket out for the chairman's charity.

I would envision opening the hall up at about 8:30 to set up, have people arrive from 9am, stop serving at around 10:30 so we can start tidying up and then close up at 11am. I appreciate that these times will clash with church services, but I don't think you could start much earlier and finishing later might interfere with the volunteers' plans for Christmas dinner.

We could gauge interest through Facebook, our Local Life magazine advert and the through consultation with the senior citizens committee and with AGE UK in St Helens. I wouldn't suggest making this only for those who would be on their own, but as something to which all are welcome. If there is insufficient demand then naturally we wouldn't go ahead.
